— HERITAGE OPEN DAYS —

'Heritage Open Days' is England's largest festival of history and culture, bringing together over 2,000 organisations, 5,000 events and 40,000 volunteers. Every year in September, places across the country throw open their doors to celebrate their heritage, community and history. This year North Ferriby is excited to participate in the 'Heritage Open Days Festival', in partnership with Hull and the East Riding over the weekend of 16th and 17th September by opening our historic village.

We will be opening the Anne Turner Memorial Allotments, All Saints' Church and the Bell tower. There will be an exhibition of the Oakleaf replica Bronze Age boat by the Ferriby

Heritage Trust on the Riverside Walkway along with a collection of classic and super cars. Over the weekend there will be Free guided walking talks by local resident Ian Wiles and Hull Tour Guide Paul Schofield.

Further details will be published in the Heritage Open Days' magazine available in the library, at Riding for the Disabled and various venues this summer.

The North Ferriby Village Trail has been rebooted. The trail was originally designed by Miss Kay Laister with Simon Hudson and was first published by the Conservation Society in Autumn 1992. We provided an afternoon tea for 70 in the village hall and we were delightfully entertained by the 20 members of the primary school choir. They sang several songs including a French one which particularly pleased the visitors.

Staying with host families in the village, we all enjoyed a coach trip to the National Mining Museum in Wakefield followed by the Yorkshire Sculpture Park nearby where we picnicked in the magnificent parkland. It was a glorious May day.

In their spare time, hosts took their guests to explore York or Beverley, Hull and The Deep, a walk along the foreshore, across the bridge or to other places.

Some tried fish and chips for the first time or went out for a typical pub meal.

A farewell get-together on their final evening took place in the Village Hall with an array of buffet food and dancing to Dr Jive.



POSITIVE NEWS ON THE NEW EAST RIDING LOCAL PLAN

With the support of North Ferriby Football Club and the East Riding Football Association, North Ferriby Parish Council has successfully argued for the reinstatement of recreational Open Space to the south of any proposed housing development on the land behind Ferriby Primary School known as Ferriby B in the new Local Plan. ERYC Planning officers had initially proposed to remove the recreational open space existing in the present Local Plan. If Ferriby B is developed it is hoped the land provision can be used as an extension of the present playing fields.

On the opposite side of the village in Melton, the Parish Council established that the Long Plantation and the adjacent strip of land, north of the railway line, was not listed on ERYC's asset register and was not shown correctly in the existing 2016 Local Plan nor in the new proposed plan. After challenge, this has been corrected in the proposed Local Plan which has now been submitted to the Planning Inspectorate for examination in public.

The Parish Council has insisted that this oversight in the existing plan and any implications be submitted to ERYC's Audit Committee.
